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World's Governments Urged To Protect Children From Excessive Food Advertising

oncerned with the impact of promotional gimmicks on the eating habits of children, the World Health Organization (WHO) recently r e c o m m e n d e d governments to lessen children's overall exposure to food and drink marketing.

According to WHO, governments

should also set rules t a r g e t s . "on the persuasive techniques companies can use, with a view to protecting children from the adverse impacts marketing."

"Food and drink marketing is a vast and increasingly sophisticated industry, and children are among its prime

Advertisements on TV, the Internet and mobile phones are being integrated with sponsorship agreements and product placement to maximize their impact," said a WHO statement.

The WHO further warned that many advertisements

promote foods that are high in fat, sugar and salt, which should be consumed limitedly if a healthy diet is to be achieved. Citing an analysis of television broadcasting Greece in 2007 and 2008, the agency showed that 65 percent of food advertisements promoted foods high

in fats, sugar and salt. "Food advertising and other forms of marketing have been shown to influence children's food preferences, purchasing behavior and overall dietary behavior," it said.

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Advertisements and marketing have also been linked with an increased risk of overweight and obesity in children. The habits children acquire early in life may persuade them to "adopt unhealthy dietary practices which persist into adulthood, increasing the likelihood of overweight, obesity and associated health problems such as diabetes

cardiovascular diseases."

According to Amanda Long, director general Consumers International, "food companies spend billions of dollars developing marketing that really works."

...And The Wicked Shall Fall

Philippine society, no doubt, is rapidly becoming more diverse and more complex as a result of the information revolution the whole world is experiencing now. As we transform as a people, adapting to the high tech age, one thing

is clear: we are not the same people anymore as 20 years back. We are going through a cultural change so vast it is redefining our civilization. In the wake of such grand upheavals, we face numerous crises. But, by far, the most significant of these is a political phenomena that continues to baffle even the wisest among us. And this is...the obliteration of consensus.

It's bad enough that our government is infested with thieves who, because of their avarice, persistently defeat our national purpose and cause us all to wallow in failure, ineptness, hypocrisy and lies. A treasonous leadership devoid of integrity will certainly make it doubly hard to cope with the great challenge currently gripping us.

Persisting in Old, Failing Ways

Traditional politics, long-outdated and thus largely incongruent with the times, remains in use, wholly negating the government's capacity to make fast, intelligent, and effective decisions. And nothing is being done to correct this grave error, despite the fact that Malacanang, the Supreme Court, the Senate and Congress are so squeezed for decisions on a million situations, all deteriorating at exponential rates as they are kept without resolutions.

As each day compels evermore creative solutions to a host of new problems, the bureaucracy is further crushed under a great big heap of decisional overload. Practically all public desks are inundated with simultaneous demands that are becoming more and more unfamiliar. Myriad requests flood the legislatures through the telephone, mobile text, email, hardcopy letters, and street protests. Accustomed to managing only a few organized constituencies, traditional politicians now find themselves besieged on all fronts.

The tremendous pile-up of demands is leaving lesser and lesser time for deliberation. Congress, as a result, has lost all coherence as it is caught in an impossible gridlock. When once upon a time, their candor-filled halls echoed prudent and wise debates from idealist statesmen, the Congress and the Senate today are more comparable to a belligerent circus, as evidenced in many televised inquiries and committee hearings supposedly "in aid of legislation", where only confusion and futility result from all the hoopla, whatever the subject matter. And since 21st century Philippine society is still transforming at an ever-increasing pace, the situation, undoubtedly, will only get worse.

While the mountain of unresolved issues keeps on growing, it would be consoling to know if, at least, there is progress in dealing with the most important ones. But even resolutions to the most critical matters hang in limbo.

Normally ignored by a myopic-minded leadership that seems more interested in personal profits than anything else, this reality is suddenly highlighted in times of crises and sudden catastrophes. Senators and congressmen, judges, governors, mayors and cabinet officials quickly become embarrassing jokes as they appear so useless in situations that require fast and decisive actions, as in times of natural calamities, sudden economic collapse, food and energy shortages, oil spills and mining accidents, surprise acts of terrorism, foreign invasion, and the endangerment of marine resources, forests and animal species. As a matter of fact, because of the excruciatingly slow and poor response of government to so many emergencies and situations that cannot afford to be treated with such gross neglect, President Aquino is now called a "lame duck".

The Yolanda Example

On top of earlier criticisms of poor emergency response and relief work in the wake of the Super Typhoon Yolanda, P-Noy is now taking flak for a recovery program that couldn't be any slower nor more diminutive in relevance, as compared to the real task at hand.

With the DAP (Disbursement Acceleration Program) and the PDAF (Priority Development Assistance Fund) and other resources from international, national and local donors that have already been directed to the cause of the victims of Yolanda, material means for the rehabilitation of devastated areas should be quite considerable. Yet, one year later, inexplicably snail-paced operations, and unproductiveness (save for some token action meant for propaganda), underlie the efforts to turn up the situation. Tacloban's denizens, in particular, are generally still in the relief phase and barely starting to recover, after all this time. No less than the Office of the Presidential Assistant for Rehabilitation and Recovery (OPARR) corroborates this as a fact.

Typhoon Yolanda affected 1.5 million families of whom 918,261 families were outright displaced. Casualties included 6,300 deaths and 1,061 missing aside from 28,689 injured. The government supposedly drew up targets for repair, rehabilitation and reconstruction as soon as it could, but according to OPARR data available as of September 2014, these targets are still far from being met.

Only 215,471 (or only 14.3%) out of the 1.5 million families affected have benefited from the Cash for Building Livelihood Assets projects, so far. Only 44,870 fisherfolk were provided fishing gears and 32,081 fisherfolk had their bancas replaced or repaired, and only 4,507 seaweed farmers have been assisted. Only 9,149 farmers were provided farm implements, 2,482 farmers given seeds and 160 farmers helped with animal restocking. Just 27 public markets out of the target 132 have been repaired or rehabilitated. And only 58 kilometers of farm-to-market roads out of the target 315 kilometers have been rehabilitated or constructed.

Yolanda victims remain largely in temporary and transitional shelters. Some 1.2 million houses were damaged or destroyed, of which some 500,000 were completely destroyed. The OPARR however only reports 364 housing units completed in Tacloban and Tanauan, Leyte.

Children are still unable to return to school buildings and classrooms. Some 6.9 million textbooks, learning materials and learning kits and 517 computer packages are being distributed. Yet only 213 classrooms have been repaired out of the target 19,648 classrooms. Only 13 health facilities have been rehabilitated. Meanwhile some 18 doctors, 668 nurses and 233 midwives have been deployed in Regions VII and VIII.

It can't be that the government is prioritizing infrastructure in place of such glaring human needs, because only 5.8 kilometers of national roads have been repaired or rehabilitated out of a target 116 kilometers. Only 3 bridges out of 34 included in the budget; 6 out o 43 damaged port facilities; 33 out of 99 flood control features; 25 out of 153

municipal, city and provincial halls; and only 21 out of 161 civic centers—have seen reparation, after one year.

So many people, who were already in very poor and vulnerable conditions even before Typhoon Yolanda's devastation, are now enduring barely survival conditions because of government ineptness. It's been almost a year, yet genuine community recovery escapes them. Seeing how the government has been, many have lost hope.

Reeking of Disservice

Not just Yolanda victims, but an entire nation of hopeful and deserving Filipinos are denied a better society by a stubborn leadership so unwilling to accept that the days of secret pillage, mass deception and lip service hypocrisy are gone, and with these their ability to effectively govern. The trillions of pesos speedily disbursed by government annually through the PDAF and the DAP could not curb the incidence of human rights abuse by state forces, including extrajudicial killings, forced disappearances and torture. The military and police perpetrators, of these atrocities against the civilian population, go on unabated and with impunity as if the democratic government was non-existent.

26 years after Corazon Aquino's Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program, supposedly to give more lands to poor farmers, poverty among majority of its said beneficiaries has not been reduced, and in fact has even resulted in the creation of a new class of farmers: the landless poor. Yet all this time, no decisive action had been taken to correct the erroneous program that obviously was doomed to fail from the start.

Even as the economy reportedly grew by an average of 5% annually, expanding by as much as 33.8% from 2006 to 2012, and despite P76.1 billion spent on Conditional Cash Transfer Programs, the number of poor families increased by 10.6%, estimated at 4.2 million in 2012.

Amidst the Philippine government's massive failure to establish its sovereignty of the islands, resulting in the continued encroachment by the Chinese, the impertinent intrusions by the Americans, to be recognized by the encroaching Chinese, the impertinent Americans, and the definitive loss of Sabah—our deceitful leadership continues to make Filipinos believe in the fantasy of a peaceful Mindanao where the Moro people will be allowed to live autonomously yet harmoniously with the rest of the nation, while the Islamic insurgency that's been ablaze since the 1960s will simply disappear. Currently brandishing the Bangsamoro Basic Law as if it were a magic pill that will instantly cause Mindanao's headaches to go away, the Aquino administration, on the contrary, may very well be carving a deeper divide that would split the nation farther apart. Mindlessly depending on a poorly concocted legislation—riddled with unconstitutional provisions, stipulations on autonomy that could lead to the dismemberment of a country, and ambiguous definitions of a territory that would drive Congress to lunacy, perhaps spending years and years in trying to thresh out—this very critical issue, which has raged tirelessly between skies of war and peace, at tremendous cost, is after all still adrift and far from being resolved.

Such horrific delays, failure and negligence really just mirror the disarray in government. Circumstances may differ from one public office to another, but what does not differ is the fact that all of the public services and the so-called government functions have grown too slow to keep up with the pace of change and too undifferentiated to cope with the new levels of social and political diversity. Even with the frenetic schedules of government officials, hardly anything is achieved.

Designed for a much slower and simpler society, our government institutions, including GOCCs (Government Owned and Controlled Corporations), seem swamped and out of sync. It's become impossible for our government, as it is presently structured, to devote sustained attention to any issue, much less come up with the best resolution to address them. As bad as it looks, however, this might actually be a good sign. The total failure of government is probably what we need to change the rotten system and break away from the cycle of corrupt administrations and dynasties taking turns in plundering the public coffers.

When the Powerful Becom Useless

Unfortunate as it may seem for traditional politicians and rattled presidents swimming obliviously in multiple pools of ineffectiveness, the crisis is rooted on more than just their inability to keep up with such incredibly accelerative pressures. For even as they attempt to respond as quick as they could to address the nation's needs, they'll find themselves paralyzed again by the second revolutionary challenge posed by these times to traditional management: endless diversification.

While the increasingly faster pace of these times is overwhelming our systems because public servants, the tasks demanded of them are also becoming more and more specific every time. Countless new social groups, suddenly emerging with politial clout, are further complicating matters as they simultaneously require the attention of politicians to new issues that are becoming more narrow and unfamiliar. Thus, traditional politicians-as in their very essence in today's society—are utterly defeated.

We see them now, fighting amongst themselves, launching demolition jobs against each other, and exposing the opposite camp's pluderous acts. They all seem to be in panic, feeling the last of their days.

These traditional politicians who refuse to part from the old order that made them rich and powerful, popular and needed, are now staggering with the new kind of reality rolling in and consequently pushing them out of their once-secure places. Among this last batch of kleptocrats, many will fumble as they attempt to deal with a new strain of people who are less needy of their authority, less submissive to the leadership, and evidently thinking more on their own. Out of tricks and swiftly becoming more powerless, as each day unfolds without promise, the most stubborn of this breed of corrupt, myopic-minded, hypocritical rulers will one by one accept the reality they've been denying for the longest time: their extinction. For at last, it is no longer their world.

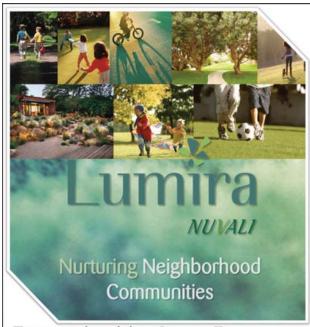






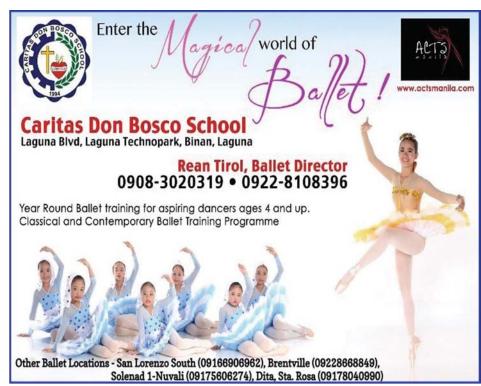
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10 Habits To Correct For A Longer, Healthier Life

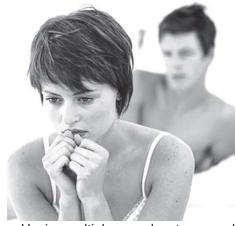
Certain bad habits could actually have direct adverse effects on our health, if not kill us. These are ten examples:

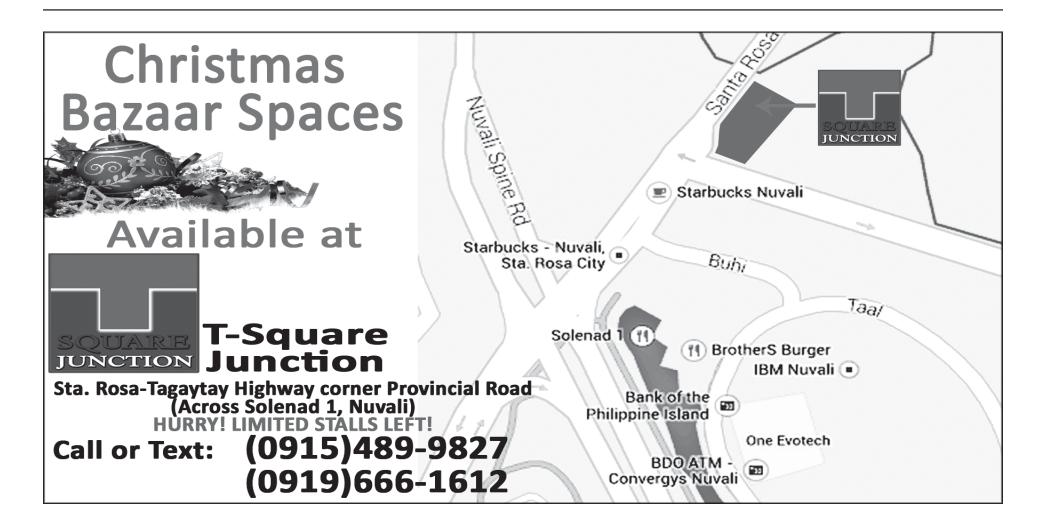

Do your best to kick bad habits out of your life before they do more damage. The chains of habit are usually too small to be felt early on, but eventually, they become too strong to be broken.



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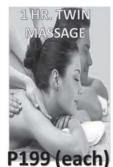
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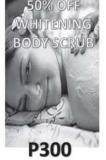
